Payoke: What we do

Legal Assistance

- Advice and assistance throughout legal proceedings
- Contacts and mediation with police, justice, and legal profession
- Start legal proceedings in name of the client and/or in name of Payoke

Administrative Support

- Request for residence documents
- Request for work permits
- Arrangements with social services, health insurers, etc.

Psycho-Social Support

- Dealing with trauma (coordinating psychological counseling)
- Assistance with integration (registering for language classes, finding a job, support for administrative and social formalities, and ambulant support)
- © Coordination of medical assistance

Assistance in Returning

In partnership with IOM, assist in returning to country of origin



Key concerns of victims

Insecurity of their situation

- Will I be able to stay? Will I be deported?
- Will I be free to live here on my own?
- Will my trafficker find out I am seeking assistance?
- o Will I be able to find a job?
- o Will I ever get over this?
- Will I be able to make it on my own?
- o Will my children be alright?

Financial situation

- How can I pay back my debt to the traffickers?
- How will my family at home get by without me making money?
- How can I afford to live on my own without a good paying job?
- How will I find a job so that I can start making money?

Their emotional state

- Will I ever be able to move on with my life?
- Will I have the confidence needed to start a new life?
- Will I ever be able to see my family at home again?
- o Am I worthy of a new start?
- o Am I responsible for this situation?
- o How could I have been so stupid?
- o How can I ever tell my family what happened?
- Will I ever be able to trust people again?

Safety of family

- o Will my trafficker find my family?
- Will my trafficker force my family to pay the debt?
- o Will my trafficker hurt my child/ren?
- Will my trafficker retaliate against my family?

Their safety

- o Will my trafficker find me?
- Will I be able to walk around the city without fear?
- What if someone recognises me and tells my trafficker where I am?
- What will happen to the other people I worked with if my trafficker finds out I got assistance?
- Will the trafficker be able to get to my children?
- Will I have protection while at the shelter?
- o Will the police protect me?
- Is someone available to help me when I need it?

Medical conditions

- o Will I have to get an HIV test?
- Will I have to tell people if I am HIV positive?
- o Will I be deported if I am HIV positive?
- Where do I go to get my illness treated?(if terminally/chronically ill)
- o Will I be able to have children?



Payoke Support Team Activities and Social Partners:

- ►OCMW: financial intervention, medical
- ► Huis van het Nederlands/ language schools: language classes
- ► PINA: mandatory integration course
- ► VDAB: job search, work card "C"
- ► Landlords: make contacts, arrange leases
- ► Health care facilities and doctors
- ► Lawyers, police, prosecutors
- ► Court accompaniment
- ► Psychological assistance/trauma treatment



Positive results seen recently

- **Better detection of victims**
- Prompt referrals to specialized victim centres
- Better investigation techniques and coordination
- **Confiscations awarded to the victims**
- **Family reunification**

Why is it so difficult to identify victims of human trafficking?

- Lack of legal framework
- Nature of the crime
- Inability to recognise victims
- Absence of a coordinated response to identification
- The way victims view their experiences



Our recommendations for improving victim identification

- Create a strong network, ensuring good cooperation and coordination mechanisms are in place
- Clarify roles and responsibilities
- Ensure key stakeholders are knowledgeable about the crime of trafficking and its victims
- Train front-line services to be aware of indicators and provide them resources to act upon suspicions
- Talk to suspected victims using appropriate interviewing techniques
- Listen, listen, listen!!!



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
